8th Annual Church Camp

Like all churches, we have customs and traditions that everyone enjoys. One of the annual traditions that everyone looks forward to is our church camp over the Easter weekend. This was the 8th such camp. Christians from Alotau and the surrounding villages came together for a weekend of singing, worship, and fellowship.

Our theme this year was, “Following Jesus to the Cross: What it Means to be a True Disciple of Jesus”. We had about 10 different men who prepared lessons anywhere from 5 minutes to 30 minutes in length.

5 Ways Our Camp Was Different than Any You’ve Been To

1. **Time is not of the essence.** PNG is not a time-oriented culture. Sessions typically run 30 minutes to an hour late. The faithful few who arrive at the start of a session sing to encourage others to join them.
2. **Sitting on a cement floor.** Let’s just say I was happy to have been given several opportunities to speak. I’m not sure my back could have managed many more 2 hour plus sessions.
3. **Rice roasting over an open fire.** The meals consisted of rice, vegetable, and a can of either tuna or pork. In the morning, the breakfast crew was up at 4:45 to start preparing for breakfast.
4. **No bedding.** A few fortunate ones brought a small mattress. The rest just lay down on the cement floor and slept where they could. I even saw two teenage boys sharing one blanket.
5. **Singing, singing, and more singing.** I think people love the singing most. After our first evening session (with over an hour of singing), a group of men stayed up from 10 p.m. to 4 a.m. singing. The Energizer bunny has nothing on them.

I'm thrilled to report that I just finished editing the entire curriculum and printing it out. Now it is available for the women to use during children's Bible class.

We're excited that Hannah has successfully completed kindergarten! She did a great job. We are both thankful for the summer break we get to enjoy.

Craig and I have been teaching the kids about North America in preparation for our furlough. They're excited about flying, and we're all ready for a change of pace. We hope to see many of you soon!
